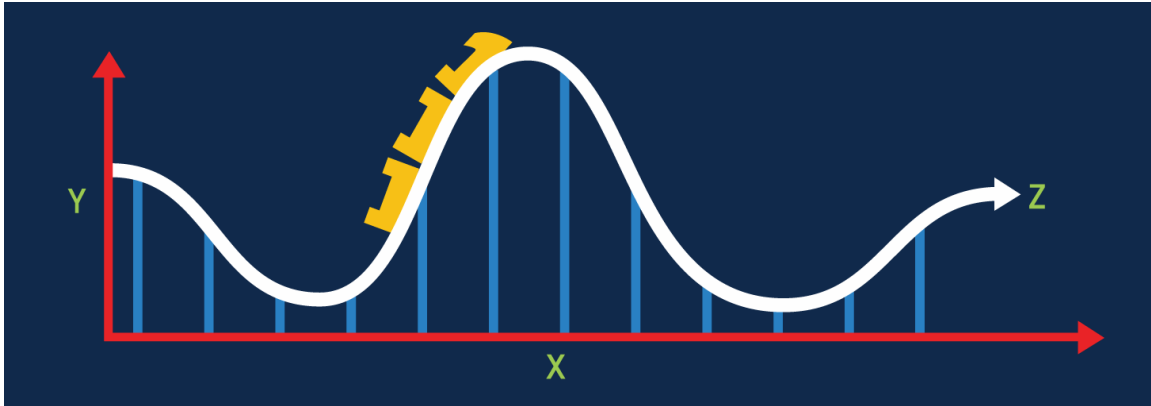




Fun and Excitement

To build your Fun & Excitement portfolio you can:

- Represent your enthusiasm and passion for a subject in a creative way.
- Create a visual representation of what you find fun and exciting and why.
- Spend time with someone who is extremely passionate about something. Write about his or her passion – what does it look like, how is it expressed, how did this person become so passionate?
- Design a lesson that covers the same material in a more interesting way than the one typically presented. Present your ideas to the teacher. Include your lesson plan and design in the portfolio.
- Get involved with an activity that others seem to enjoy. Reflect on your level of enjoyment with this activity.
- Learn about something you find interesting that you can't learn in school. Document your learning.
- Create a list of what you think will be fun about your post-secondary choices. Research the truth behind what you think will be fun and what really exists. For example, you might plan on going into the military and think it will be fun to travel. Research whether one does travel or not in the military. Document your learning.
